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2019 ANNUAL REPORT

Victoria University Student Union (VUSU) is the peak representative student body at Victoria University, Melbourne, Australia. VUSU represents and supports all students at Victoria University (VU). The stated objectives of VUSU are to provide a range of representation and general services to a student population of approximately 40,000 across all campuses of the university.

VUSU provides representation and advocacy to all VU students. Student representatives often provide support to students when needed, and when students have complaints and grievances against Victoria University. VUSU representatives lobby the University for Inclusive Services that benefit all students.

VUSU representatives are elected annually by the student body. Elections are fundamental to the democratic nature of the organisation. Participation rates in VUSU elections vary from year to year; in 2018 approximately 6% of enrolled students voted in the election, a high percentage of participation relative to other Victorian universities.

VUSU conducts Board and Executive meetings to facilitate informed discussion with the aim of making decisions. Mobile information booths and surveys conducted via the website and social media channels facilitate the exchange of information between VUSU representatives and the students they represent. Forums and symposiums with staff and students are an opportunity for students to come and voice their views on issues they face.

VUSU is affiliated to the National Union of Students (NUS). The NUS is the peak student representative body in Australia. It has over 600,000 members within Australian tertiary institutions. VUSU is a proud member of NUS and values the contribution it makes to further the interests of students. Each year VUSU sends delegates to the National NUS Conferences. Those delegates take part in the democratic process of formulating NUS policy and electing NUS office bearers.

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MEMBERSHIP

The Student Union is a member-based not for profit organisation. The VUSU Constitution defines five categories of membership:

- Governing Members
- VIP Members
- Life Members
- Executive Officer
- Associate Members

Cost of Membership for 2019 was \$30 from 1st January 2019 to 31st December 2019, with a half yearly membership cost of \$15 from 1st July 2019 to 31st December 2019.

The VUSU Executive and VUSU Board has the authority to confer life memberships to individuals who have made an outstanding contribution to the Student Union and the Victoria University community.





PRESIDENT REPORT

What a wonderful 2019! This year's achievements have been out of this world! I am so proud of each and every one of our Office Bearers, Committee Members and VUSUteers, who, without none of this year would have been possible. The team has worked so thoroughly together and achieved massive goals.

The support VU Students have received by each member of the team and collectively has increased since 2018 and the feedback from these students shows. Engagement has been a key priority of VUSU this year, with an increase in the VIP Memberships as well as events and initiatives.

The 2018 AGM began with some great Constitutional Amendments creating new

Office Bearer Positions for 2019 and allowing for dual positions for non-executive Officer Bearers, which allowed VUSU to appoint Office Bearers such as Digital Media, Accessibility and VUSUteer Coordinator,

These amendments also allowed for VUSU to elect dual Officer Bearers in the 2019 Annual Elections. These amendments also allowed for committees to be established under the Welfare, Activities and Education Portfolios.

The transition to Block Model in 2019 for many students brought achievements and hardships. The team worked closely with staff and students to ensure that accountable information was provided and continues to be provided to students. VUSU has had an active part in communication tools between staff and students and have worked closely with the Director of Student Services to continuously gauge feedback and support to students on their journey through Block Model.



The VUSU Executive were invited to present at the 2019 Student Leadership Conference, themed *Inclusive Leadership: Leadership for All* where the team spoke and engaged with student leaders on *Diversity in Leadership*, with each Executive member articulating their portfolio needs and wants under the theme. The Executive members each took back important information, feedback and general student engagement and inserted this into their committees and portfolios.



VUSU is a member organisation of the National Union of Students (“NUS”) carrying out a key campaign *A Future Worth Fighting For*. This campaign was active throughout the entire year, and specifically around the Federal Election where VUSU encouraged and reminded all students to ensure they were not only registered to vote, but provided information on student welfare and budgetary factors that related to the election outcome.



VUSU also attended the NUS 2019 Education Conference taking a record 12 students to participate in workshops and information plenaries developed and delivered by students for students. Education conference highlighted key issues that students face on a national level and provided deep insight to the team on how Student Unions and Student Organisations can support students on campus and national levels. VUSU will be in attendance of the NUS 2019 National Conference in early December 2019.





A key campaign brought into Victoria University in 2019 by VUSU was the Be a Better Human Campaign (“BaBH”). This campaign was imperative to our community in and outside of Victoria University, and I could not be more proud of the reception this campaign by staff and students. VUSU particularly thank Safer Community, Respect & Responsibility, and Student Wellbeing for their support throughout the development and action of the campaign.



“In 2017, The Australian Human Rights Commission conducted a randomised survey of university students, including students here at Victoria University, and released the National Report on Sexual Assault and Sexual Harassment at Australian Universities. The report offered many suggestions for Universities to adopt and while we think those recommendations are fantastic, here at VU we want to do even better! This initiative was created with a group of Flinders students from the ground up, to reflect campus culture and what we think everyone needs to appreciate – consent, respect and empathy. The campaign is called Be a Better Human (BaBH), because we don’t just want it to be about what we shouldn’t do; we want it to be about self-improvement for everyone. And when we say ‘everyone’, we really do mean everyone. We’re encouraging everyone who is part of our campus community to take a moment and consider how we can ‘better’ our behaviour. The general outline of this project is to bring in materials on education, including booklets, merchandise (t-shirts, pens, etc) as well as to hold a clubs festival space where the information can be passed along to students in a personalised manner. This would include Be a Better Human campaign info, student club stalls, performances and special guest speakers, free food and giveaways including awesome BaBH shirts, pens and more! Events like the BaBH festival help build a culture of respect, empathy and consent for all students and staff. “Victoria University has a zero tolerance approach to violence in any form, including sexual and gender-based violence. Gender-based violence is a serious social issue driven by gender inequality and enabled by sexist attitudes and behaviours. We work to build a culture of safety and respect, where students and staff are empowered to become change agents to help stop gender-based violence at the University and in the wider community.” (VU Respect & Responsibility)

GENERAL SECRETARY REPORT

This year has been awesome for the growth and development of VUSU across the whole of Victoria University, with engagement and promotion moving to an all time high. We have done incredible things from the Be a Better Human festival to VUSU Hangs and so much more in between.

VUSUTEER COORDINATOR

I personally started this year as the VUSUteer Coordinator and was really excited to make this role my own and promote volunteering across the union and university itself. By the end of Summer O Week, we had almost tripled the number of signed up volunteers from the year before and my plans for the VUSUteers were growing with each signed up student.

During O Week we had a good amount of volunteer engagement with a few

VUSUteers only taking one day off during the whole two weeks event across the Higher Education and the Polytechnic sectors. It was great to see that the sort of student we were appealing to were dedicated and passionate ones. During the Footscray Park Orientation Day we had as many as 6 or 7 VUSUteers volunteering with us which was awesome to engage and meet these awesome people but also to have bodies on the ground because as we know many hands make light work. To date we have 136 VUSUteers signed up, an increase from 2018's numbers of 25.

GENERAL SECRETARY

I was appointed the General Secretary by the VU Student Union Board in March. I was extremely excited and privileged to be taking on this role within the executive and looked forward to the impact I could make here. This role included me building relationships and developing the College Societies and the Office Bearers while working closely with the university to work through potential hurdles that have arisen with the continued role out of the Block Model and other VU initiatives.



LOUGHBOROUGH STUDENT UNION

One of these VU opportunities was meeting Student Representatives from the Loughborough University Student Union (LSU). We meet and compared what each union does to help students and both parties took away some great insights from the other. We also grew great relationships with them by attending an AFL game with them and a few dinners with the three guys too which was really rewarding on a personal development level.



VUSU/VU

VUSU worked closely with the university and both parties kept a very good relationship and worked together to get things done and address student issues. VUSU also developed strong club relationships, this was clearly displayed through the increased number of collaborations with clubs that took place in 2019. Members of the Executive also were invited to the Clubs dinner and that was a great night to build relationships and brainstorm ideas for further collaboration into the future.

MEMBERSHIP

This year VUSU really strived to boost campus awareness and how well we were known around the whole VU community, this was seen by our growth in sign ups and purchase of our 'VIP Merch Pack'. By the end of 2018 we had 25 VUSUteers signed up, if we compare this figure to the current number of VUSUteers it's clear to see that students wanted to be a part of the team any way they could. The VUSUteer numbers jumped from 25 to 136 as it currently stands. Our 'VIP' membership changed from it's initial role out in 2018 with more goodies being included and student discounts at businesses being utilised too. In 2018 we sold 66 VIP Merch packs and in 2019 to date we have sold 95 which is very positive for the direction of the union into the future.



VICE-PRESIDENT EDUCATION REPORT

My name is Alexander Haw, and I have been lucky enough to be elected the Vice President of Education at Victoria University Student Union for 2019. This role has tested me and has had its hiccups but at every turn the team has supported me. The connections and skills that I have gained this year will be so very useful as I walk into the roles of Gen sec and I can not wait for next year.

It's weird reminiscing on the start of the year now. So much has changed and so much growth has happened to both me team and I. The first big event for me was the Student Forum. Whilst the information was incredibly useful and relevant I feel like students did not engage well with this platform.


There were many things to improve on. Overall we reached approximately 20 students online and in person.

Key improvements were; better recording equipment, ensuring that we organize panelists sooner, a maximum of 5 panelists, moving the event to an open area. However whilst I think the idea of getting information out to the student body is a great idea I no longer believe that this is the approach that VUSU should take to accomplish that goal. Rather another idea needs to be suggested to engage the students with the internal running of the university.

One of my most personal projects was creating a Student as Staff (SAS) working group within the university to better engage those students that have started the steps to engage with the university. In the future with the help of VU I am hoping that this working group will help highlight those students that are willing to help out with VUSU and the cause to help other students.



Further work has been done on the Study pack and Chill out trolley in the attempt to stream line and make it easier on the incoming education officer.



Whilst I did not accomplish as much as I would have liked. The study packs we did deliver were warmly welcomed. Further improvements include a competition in the study packs, an area set aside for study pack stuff, and getting the items delivered instead of going to the store. Another initiative I started was the attempt to a monthly meeting with key staff members with in the education field. Whilst these worked well in the first semester as a way for this group of people to sit down and explain what each department is doing, in the second semester organising these meetings became difficult due to a high influx of work.



I suggest that each exec organises meetings like this to ensure that we are keeping in constant contact with the departments we work closely with. One project that I never managed to complete was the idea of a university guide. In the first semester I was able to create a 5 step plan to dealing with block mode that was released in the first issue of the HYDE magazine. Whilst this was well designed (thanks Cat) I never really promoted it effectively. I hope the incoming education exec will take upon this idea and work on it further to create more successful university guide.





VICE-PRESIDENT ACTIVITIES REPORT

My term started out with the 2018 end of exams party in which we collaborated with the RMIT University Student Union. This event was awesome and a way to finish our year with a bang and start my term off with a great first event.

I have been in the union for the past three years and by far 2019 was the best year for us yet. Each year VUSU progresses so much but with the team skills and the leadership of our president, Cat Abourizk, we accomplished everything we had hoped for and more.



unfortunately the feedback we got from students it wasn't as accessible by public transport as we had hoped. Overall the attendees enjoyed their night and was a success for all those who came.

CULTURAL DIVERSITY WEEK

VUSU alongside Student Life and ISA hosted Cultural Diversity Week. During the Week we had the Chinese and African Festival as well as the Holi Festival. Each festival was held at a different campus (City Flinders, St Albans and Footscray Park).

STUDENT LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

The Student Leadership Conference was hosted by VU Student Life in which there was guest speakers, staff and students learning about leadership within our university. The VUSU executive team was asked to make a presentation on Diversity in Leadership within VUSU. I nervously presented welfare and accessibility within events.

DE-STRESS WEEK

VUSU always goes above and beyond for students; during semester 1 of 2019 we wanted to make De-stress week more than the usual, so we went around to the campuses and brought something new to each. At St Albans we not only had therapy dogs but had cup-cakes and a lot of student engagement. At City Queen we had yoga. At Footscray Park we brought an entire festival. During the De-stress festival we had VU departments, staff and students, we had face painting, VUSU Hangs, henna, live music, clubs and societies and a petting zoo. The de-stress festival would easily be one of my favourite things that VUSU hosted this year.

ANNUAL BALL – WINTER WONDERLAND BALL



By the end of the ticket sales we had reached just under 200 tickets sold (due to the Block Model we had less traction than the previous year). BE A BETTER HUMAN FESTIVAL

Another amazing VUSU festival was our Be a Better Human festival. This festival originated from students at Flinders University and they allowed another Universities such as La Trobe Student Union (LTSU), RMIT University Student Union (RUSU) and VUSU to bring it to all students across each university. The campaign itself is simple; Be a Better Human – Empathy, Consent and Respect. We hosted this event at Footscray Park with VU departments, staff and students, clubs and societies, college societies, live music, guest speakers and VUSU hangs. This festival was amazing and was beautiful to watch the VU community come together and collectively be better humans.

WINTER ORIENTATION PARTY

Pub Crawl For our orientation party for the Winter themed orientation week we decided to do a Pub Crawl around the pubs and bars around the CBD. It was a better way to get to meet everyone who came along to the event. We started off with roughly 30-40 people and because of the type of event we were able to meet each person individually. This event was great to engage and get to know people better.



VUSU Hangs

In 2018 VUSU brought in a weekly hang out for students to get free food and drinks, called VUSU Hangs. This year we continued it and upgraded it. In semester 1 of 2019 we went to each campus at least twice bringing free pizzas to our off-campus and Footscray Park had a BBQ every fortnight welcoming VU departments to join, as well as student groups and external businesses. On the off-campus we reached 100 students each time and at Footscray Park we reached 300-400 students. Each VUSU Hangs varied due to the Block Model but was a very well received regular occurring event. We learnt that VUSU Hangs is a great way to reach the VU community and get great student engagement as well as a great pathway to inform students of VUSU's upcoming events.

Becoming the VUSU VP Activities Officer has given me great opportunities in gaining so many skills personally. I gained skills in leadership and mainly for me the confidence to speak in front of a room full of people. At the beginning of my term I was very nervous in standing up in front of a room but VUSU gave me the chance to build and grow on this. 2019 has brought many ups and downs in this job but I do not regret a single moment of it.

WELFARE REPORT

CHILL OUT ZONE

VUSU Hangs Throughout the year, VUSU set out blankets, board games and cushions to give students a place to relax and chill out. It worked best when we partnered with VUSU hangs as it utilized the numbers that come for the free food. We also found that students used this to mingle and make friends, especially during the beginning of the year with students not knowing anyone and being new to University life.

WORLD'S GREATEST SHAVE

At the start of the year Daniel and Dylan participated in the Worlds Greatest Shave by shaving their hair to raise money for the Leukemia Foundation.

DE STRESS FESTIVAL

De-Stress Fest was a three day event that ran across all campuses, with different activities at each campus, including the De-Stress Zone at St Albans, De-Stress Carnival at Footscray Park, Stress Less Yoga at Queen Street and the Welfare Seminar at Footscray Park.

DE-STRESS ZONE

De-Stress Zone was held at Victoria University St Albans, the event provided a space for students to relax and de-stress before the exam period. The event provided free food, games, therapy dogs, colouring stations and a VUSU Chill Out Zone which included bean bags and music for students to enjoy and relax.

DE-STRESS CARNIVAL

De-Stress Carnival commenced on Wednesday 22nd May, De-Stress Carnival provided an outlet for students to relax and have fun, with lots of different activities such as games, therapy dogs, a VUSU Chill Out Zone, Colouring Stations, Yoga, Badminton, a Petting Zoo, Live Music, a Free Massage Chair and a free BBQ.



STRESS LESS YOGA

Stress Less Yoga, ran on the 23rd of May, at Queen Street for students by YOGAMIGO's, with all spaces being filled, the class provided a quiet relaxing space for students to reflect and de-stress.



WELFARE SEMINAR

The Welfare seminar ran for the first time ever during semester 2 of this year. With the key focus of it being Student Poverty. Special guests on the panel included the NUS Welfare officer, a member of the VU Counselors team and a member from Student Welfare at VU. Special guests in the audience included the NUS General Secretary and many others. The Seminar as a whole covered some really good content for students but was mainly viewed through live streaming as opposed to bums in seats on the day.



DE-STRESS FEST

De-Stress Fest ran from the 14th of October till the 18th of October, running across all campuses with yoga, a netflix room, free food, meditation classes, free henna, live music, balloon artists, inflatable jumping classes and therapy dogs. The event had a lot of students attend at City Flinders and Footscray Park with a big interest with the Henna artists and the free food, and an increased interest in more de-stress events.



MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TRAINING

The Mental Health First Aid Training ran from June until November, and allowed students to partake in First Aid Training and Mental Health Training, the Training has had a fantastic turnout with Students attending over the year. The Mental Health First Aid Training has continued to be a successful event ran by welfare throughout the year.



CULTURAL DIVERSITY REPORT

I had an amazing year with VUSU. I joined VUSU in mid-April and was cultural Diversity officer.

To begin with I went to National Education Conference in Sydney with VUSU and learned a lot about union policies and what we believe, in terms of students.

Secondly, I organized two events in collaboration with ISA. Trivia Night was my first event which was held in Our pride Footscray bar. Around 15 people showed up making it very descent event. Second event Diwali, which I organized was with collaboration with ISA, VUIC, VUP. It was one of the most successful on campus event for 2019. Around 150-200 people showed up and enjoyed the dance performances, Indian food and the firecrackers. It was one of the distress event for Victoria University students as exams were nearby.

I enjoyed my time at VUSU, and I am going to miss being part of this happy family where people support everyone at every time.





WOMEN'S REPORT

This year, the VUSU women's portfolio achieved all the goals set at the Induction meeting at the start of the year. We achieved this through a range of events and initiatives as well as collaborating with VU students on projects that benefited the female identifying population at Victoria University.

THE WONDERWOMAN SERIES

The WonderWoman series was the first video series for the women's portfolio. It aimed to explore the strength of the survivors of domestic violence and abuse. This series explored a range of issues from the stereotypes and perceptions of domestic violence survivors to the different types of abuse such as financial abuse. The series was well received by the VU community and the trailer alone has currently reached almost seven thousand people on Facebook alone.

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY HIGH TEA

The International Women's Day was the official event for International women's day. The high tea was a sold-out event that had attendance from both genders and was very successful. It was also the official launch of The WonderWoman series. It was run in collaboration with the VUSU Welfare committee and involved serving simple breakfast items such as ham and cheese toasties, yoghurt and muesli and various juices. The breakfast served over 50 VU students



THE WOMEN'S ROOM GRAND REOPENING

We worked with the Director of Student Service to reopen the women's rooms and extend the opening hours. We also held the Sips, Cheese and Sweets party to celebrate the official opening of the women's rooms. This event was very well attended and included The Respect and Responsibility team, Manager of Cultural Diversity Teresa De Fazio and other VU students, both male and female. The room is now a fully functioning safe space for women and is also regularly stocked with food for female identifying students



CODE PINK x VUSU

Code Pink are a group of female students who are completing a research project. We collaborated with them to establish a sanitary product donation bin which were placed around various parts of the university. The donations from this project are made available to women in the women's rooms. This is in addition to the pads and tampons that are currently provided to students in Building M.



LIPTEMBER FESTIVAL

The Liptember festival aimed to raise more awareness for women's mental health. Participants wear a bold lip colour to start more conversations about women's mental health. The event included a panel discussing a range of mental health issues including coping with domestic violence to loneliness in international students.



SEXUAL ASSAULT DISCLOSURE INFO VIDEO

The sexual assault disclosure video handles information about what to do if someone discloses an incident regarding a sexual assault. The video contains what is appropriate to say in various situations as well how to take care of yourself as disclosures can be triggering to those who have been through similar experiences. The video is a production that has involved VU students and staff and is set to release next year in 2020 with the incoming women's officers.





LGBTQIA+ REPORT

This year has been magical for the Queer community, with the opening of 6 Pride rooms on campuses, with another two next year. The new queer officer for 2020 is already planning activities and events for the community. In 2020 VU will join the collation of queer departments for all universities and will have a say on things like the use of “pink money”. At the end of this year the interunit queer dinner will give Vu an opportunity to introduce themselves and network into areas that will help VUSU.

The University disburses money on VUSU's behalf as allocated from the Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF). The University Profit and Loss Statement for the Union account is taken directly out of the University Finance System as of 14th November 2019.


